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have to share? Works of mercy and charity prepare the heart for the gospel. They are the living proof that Jesus is in this world and that he is in our church. They are the context in which a person gradually grows to trust us, to see Jesus in us, eventually becoming eager to know the message that has transformed our lives. Works of mercy are not the gospel; they cannot replace the message of God's gracious forgiveness and renewal in Jesus. But they are the preparatory and necessary accompaniment to it. They are like a welcoming doorway into a crowded house that is filled with love.

I'd like to share a few avenues of healing mercy that we are just beginning to develop as a church; pathways that you can walk in joyful obedience to our Lord.

PATHWAY 1:

WORKS OF MERCY

Over the past 18 months, our Mercy Ministry has been quietly studying the principles and practice of Christian mercy under the leadership of first, Gary Lance, and now, Barry Hodges. They have been working out systems for ministering to needy persons in our region and been very active in caring for dozens of people outside of our church. Your financial gifts to the church have been of great assistance to many lives.

Recently, the Mercy Ministry brought together area churches to form a collaborative network of churches to care for our needy friends with the goal of seeing such individuals and families brought to a place of wholeness and flourishing in Christ. This initiative is only in its first stages, but the potential of uniting resources with other churches of similar vision is tremendous. There is presently no mechanism in Stephens County for churches to work together in a manner that will fundamentally change the culture of our region. Please be praying for this new project, that all who gather might wisely discern and faithfully follow our Lord's leading. PATHWAY 2:

MISSIONAL COMMUNITIES

If works of mercy are the welcoming doorway that begin to establish trusting relationships, it is vital that the next step provide a context where the needy person can become immersed in the love of Spirit-filled community in Christ; where they can experience the tangible, incarnated realities of God's love and grace. Our culture has drifted so far from the institutional church. Many are skeptical and distrusting. Most would be unable to relate to what we are about on Sunday morning. If we are going to be true to Christ's call, we need to provide contexts where people can experience the new people of God outside of our usual church gatherings. Jesus is merely glimpsed through individual acts of Christian charity. But he comes into full view in the midst of a charitable community, where people are living out Christ's truth and love with open and sincere hearts.

We need to move people from the doorway into such a living room filled with joy. We need fellowships that are gathering outside of the present church structures and facility. We need to bring our community to the people, not require them to come to us. We need what have been called Missional Communities, full of courageous people who are willing to step out of traditional comfort zones for the sake of Christ and the gospel. These gatherings will be in homes or other nonchurch settings. They will invite "outsiders" into authentic, welcoming, non-judgmental, healing relationships, where the gospel can be presented, discussed, and celebrated.

Over the next four to six months. we will be piloting our church's first Missional Community group. This originating community will be comprised of about a dozen newer people in our church. The hope is to see several Missional Community groups established in 2020. The groups will last for a set period, regularly rotating membership so as to prevent them becoming stale, ingrown, or unintentionally exclusive. But they will need to last long enough for community dynamics to develop and outsiders to be welcomed in.

Another idea we are developing is an outreach to men that will also meet outside of the church with the hopes of encouraging not only our own men, but also welcoming men from our area who might not be interested in coming to a worship service. More about that soon

PATHWAY 3: BLUE CHRISTMAS SERVICE On December 4 our church will *Continued on Page 4*

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present to our community its second Blue Christmas Service which we call, "Upon a Midnight Clear." It is an alternative service to the artificial and often forced jollity of the season. It says that it is alright to mourn at Christmastide.

The service will be at 7 PM and will be followed by a desert fellowship in which we will play host and welcome those who have come. This is a major outreach for our church – a way to directly minister into the pain and heartache of our region. It isn't only for consciously hurting people. We all bear wounds. We all need healing. In our struggle with darkness and grief, Christ comes to give us light and hope. We want to cast a big net and invite everyone and anyone who will come.

It will be presented with the non-Christian especially in mind. It is an expression of our "Yes!" to Christ's Great Commission. It will only be well attended if each of us commits to inviting others. Here is a very simple and practical thing you can do. Please begin to pray and ask the Holy Spirit to bring to your awareness individuals you might invite. You too, brothers! Let's not leave it just to the women! Our healing Savior will go before us and do wonderful things, if we will only believe in his desire to use his powerful Word and Spirit, and our own struggling, yet loving hearts, to bring his healing grace and comfort.

We want to ask each person in the congregation to invite two or three people to attend this service. A few weeks prior to the service, we will be providing you several cards with details about the service that you can easily use to invite a person.

We also will need people to assist in distributing advertising, designing and setting up the sanctuary, reading scripture during the service, and helping with the desert fellowship following the service. If you would like to participate in some way, please speak with Angie Ramage or Jenny Bell, our codirectors.
