

Mercy Ministry Article by Barry Hodges

What is happening in the Mercy Ministry?

1.) <u>Requests for Assistance</u> There have been 45 requests for assistance since January 2019.

Of these 45 requests, 10 were guided to other County agencies to meet the need; 12 were assisted by several churches and agencies pooling our resources to meet the need; 13 were assisted by TPC; 5 only needed counseling and were directed to a special-ty resource, and 5 could not be assisted, other than counseling and suggested recommendations.

2.) Churches Collaborative Mercy Ministry members have been working diligently to organize a "Churches Collaborative" where churches within Stephens County could pool their resources to efficiently and effectively meet the needs of the benevolent within Stephens County, and to avoid duplication of meeting the requested need and to lead them to a flourishing life with Christ.

Premise:

A.) Our county has an impressive array of agencies that assist people with particular needs. However, most of these are targeting one piece of multi-faceted, complex, and systemic challenges. A needy person is often running from agency to agency, try-

ing to meet urgent needs. It is difficult for them to address the deeper, more fundamental issues necessary for building a flourishing life.

- B.) There is a need for an organization that will shepherd an individual or family through a holistic process that will enable them to put together the building blocks for a healthy life.
- C.) The Church provides the best avenue for this sort of shepherding, because our Lord meets people holistically and calls his people to do the same. This begins with the establishment of caring relationships that honors each individual as an imagebearer of God and one worthy of honor and respect. As Christians we are also privileged to serve as Christ served us called to lay down our lives for others so that they might come to know the full blessings of the peace that comes through the gospel of Christ.
- D.) The challenge is that many of our churches are small and lack the various resources to assume the responsibilities that this process requires.
- E.) Therefore, we are suggesting the creation of **a** church cooperative that will exist to holistically guide individuals and families through a healing journey to self-sufficient living and flourishing in Christ.

Initially, eight churches were invited to TPC where we had our initial meeting on October 10th.

Everyone present supported the idea of a Churches Collaborative and there were many ideas discussed.

Additional churches were invited to our second meeting on November 14th at First Alliance Church. Again we had a great deal of discussion, and agreed to pray on the idea and let God lead us to the right path.

Our next steps are for each church present to invite an assigned church(s) to the next meeting on, most likely, January 9th. The goal is to get at least 20 churches committed to move forward on the idea of a Churches Collaborative. We agreed to invite several speakers such as Noel Pauley of Family Connections, Steve Paysen of the Hope Center, Shirley's Shelter, and many more, to gain critical insight on what they believe is needed in the County, before we decide on any one direction to take and how we might be officially organized. We all agreed we did not want to duplicate any service already provided in the County. We need everyone's prayers for us as we seek to serve in a way that honors the Lord.


Some of our very own choir members will be singing in the concert. Please come and support your sisters and brothers in Christ. You'll be glad you did!


Presbyterian Women
